11.30 Delegate discussion groups

The purpose of the discussion groups is to directly address issues associated with the proposition that "Australia is in a 'budget crisis' and all Australians must share the burden – directly and indirectly". The group should write a brief statement that summarises the group's position and any actions or advice they wish to provide the government.

Questions to consider are:

- What is the nature and extent of the 'budget crisis'?

Groups should consider the Australian value of a 'fair go' and explore the proposition with particular reference to economic decisions (and their impacts) in areas such as:

- Health and disabilities
- Education
- Social welfare
- Climate change
- Foreign aid

- In what ways, and to what extent, might such economic/budget measures affect young people?

A list of groups and group meeting rooms are in delegates' folders. Some delegates will be identified as group facilitators whose role is to manage the discussion and ensure everyone has a chance to express their views. A recorder nominated by the group will write the position statement and actions. A reporter, also nominated, will report back to the Convention at the feedback session after lunch. The recorder must provide a digital copy of the group's response, including any advice, via email, to projects@sev.asn.au before lunch. The reporter MUST retain a hard copy from which to read during the reporting session.

1.30 Reporting session: Legislative Assembly

The purpose of the vote is:

- (1) to determine delegates' positions on the proposition "Australia is in a 'budget crisis' and all Australians must share the burden – directly and indirectly".
- (2) To endorse or reject and proposed action items

Delegates will be directed to vote by the Speaker.
